I believe that a large percentage start out by incorporating you into their "Positive" agenda, with hopes that you can help them to achieve their goals. But somewhere along the way, their eyes grew dim and their vision for godliness grew faint. When this happens to a pastor; what God wants becomes foggy and the members become "Expandable." And all of the sudden, we became a person that they could do without.

Whether you couldn't give enough money, participate in enough church functions, or asked way too many questions, whatever the reason, "It was time for you to go." With the plan in motion to arrange for your untimely dismissal from the church, I want to assure you that God had other plans for you.

Yes, God knew that we would be "Hurt" by the whole thing, but he also knew of the benefits that you would receive from the whole experience. I for one know that none of this would exist if I hadn't been kicked out of the church. Not to say that God

orchestrates these series of horrible events for you to leave, but I do believe that he makes it so that you realize you're now FREE!

This is the part that many struggle with and blame God for, but what we need to do is thank him for getting us out of there and saving our souls from hypocrisy and hell. In my case, I firmly believe that God allowed this to happen because he knew that I wouldn't leave without this kind of pressure and serious events to take place. I was complacent, damned, and content to believe and live a lie for the rest of my life. In my case, the pastor had the people against me because he already had me targeted and was making an occasion to rid himself of me. For those of you who just up and left without explanation, you will more than likely have them chasing after you rather than just letting you go (I saw this at my previous church, results may vary). But this is where you can't be ashamed to tell it like it is to the other members who are mesmerized by their pastors charming and hypnotic ways.

It may be difficult while sharing your story sometimes, but just remember that you have moved on with your life and your particular inspiration just might save someone from having to go through what you did.
